

# Roundtable Discussion on Good and Better Jobs in Food Processing Sector

One of the key reasons for the prevailing demand crisis in the country is low wages for most Indians and plateauing of demand for those products that Indian economy is relatively good at producing. Exacerbating this situation is increasing footprint of automation and digitalization in the manufacturing sector. Together, these developments are not only changing the nature of production but also gradually transforming labour intensive sectors.

For a consumption economy like India, this is a serious issue and we can no longer fix it for long with short term monetary and fiscal measures. While those will be necessary to some extent, it is time we go to the root and address structural issues by deep diving into labour intensive sectors or those sectors that still have considerable potential to be labour intensive. In short deep sectoral research is important to understand how can balance be restored amongst three key elements of business i.e. employment, wages and competitiveness.

Towards this endeavour, CUTS International has already culminated field inquiry into Textile and Apparel sector and now aims to consult relevant experts to formulate an informed approach for the Food processing sector.
